


LEMURS BINGO CHALLENGE

<p style="text-align: center;">NUMBER RECOGNITION AND ORDERING</p> <p>Go on a number hunt around your house, in your garden or on your daily walk. Take some photos of the numbers you see.</p> <p>What is the smallest number you find? What is the largest number?</p> <p>For an extra challenge – write the numbers that you find in order.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">SPEAKING AND LISTENING</p> <p>Find the story Jack and the Beanstalk. You may have one at home, some of your family members may be able to tell you the story.</p> <p>For an extra challenge – think about and describe how Jack might be feeling at different points in the story. When he saw the beanstalk for the first time, when he heard the Giant.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">NUMBER BONDS</p> <p>Card Challenge. Use playing cards 1-6. Pair the cards together to make a total of 6. How many ways can you make 6?</p> <p>For an extra challenge – find pairs of cards to make 10, 11 and 12</p> <div style="display: flex; justify-content: space-around; align-items: center;">  </div>	<p style="text-align: center;">HIGH FREQUENCY WORDS</p> <p>How many of your tricky word cards can you read in a minute? Can you beat your score from last week?</p> <p>Share your word cards with a partner (family member) Can you spell the word to your partner without looking at the card? (Give yourself a point for each correct spelling)</p> <p>For an extra challenge choose 3 words and write them in a sentence.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">MEASUREMENT</p> <p>Measure the beanstalk that you have made. What will you use to measure it?</p> <p>For an extra challenge – can you find something that is shorter and something that is taller than your beanstalk.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">HANDWRITING – One Armed Robot Letters</p> <div style="display: flex; align-items: center; justify-content: center;">  </div> <p>Practise writing these letters in as many ways as you would like: Using paintbrushes and water on the patio outside, Chunky chalks, Using paints, In a shallow tray with glitter, sand or shaving foam</p> <p>For an extra challenge can you write the upper case letters? H N M R B P K</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">MISSING NUMBERS</p> <p>Find a way to create a beanstalk with leaves on. You could chalk one on the floor outside or draw one.</p> <p>Ask somebody in your family to write numbers on the leaves, missing some out. This might be a sequence of teen numbers or perhaps larger numbers up to 100.</p> <p>Can you fill in the missing numbers?</p> <p>For an extra challenge – try counting in twos, fives or tens.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">CREATIVE WRITING</p> <p>Write the story of Jack and the Beanstalk in your own words. Remember to say your sentence. Say each word and write the sounds that you can hear. You can use the sound mat in your pack to help. Make sure you use capital letters, finger spaces and full stops.</p> <p>For an extra challenge – join ideas using ‘and’ or ‘but’</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">LET’S INVESTIGATE</p> <p>The Giant throws some potatoes at Jack to knock him down. ½ of them hit Jack. 8 hit him in total. How many potatoes did the Giant throw?</p> <p>Jack is climbing the beanstalk. He is 5m from the ground. He is halfway up the beanstalk. How high is the beanstalk altogether?</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">NON-FICTION WRITING</p> <p>Have you ever planted a bean or a seed? What did you need to use to plant with?</p> <p>Write about how to plant a bean. You could write a list of equipment needed or draw a picture and label it.</p> <p>For an extra challenge – Write step by step instructions using time language e.g. first, next, after that, finally</p>

PLANTS

Have a look for different plants and trees in your garden or on your daily walk.
You might find a 'spotters guide' on the internet or maybe you have some gardening books at home to help you identify the plants and trees.

How many can you name?
Do you have a favourite?

NATURAL ART

Make a collection of leaves, twigs, petals, grass. petals. Use your collection to create some art work.



BE A PHOTOGRAPHER

In your garden or on your daily walk take some photos of the plants and trees that you find.
Take some from a distance and some close up.

Take some photos of the numbers you find in your house, garden or on your daily walk.

ACT IT OUT

Find some items around the home to help you tell the story of Jack and the Beanstalk. You might find some beans, coins, eggs, cuddly toys for the cow and hen. You could draw or make a harp.

Tell the story. You could use different voices for the different characters.

MAKE A BEANSTALK

Can you build a beanstalk? You could make a tower of bricks and add some leaves, cut out a spiral, use tubes and add leaves...




BE ACTIVE

If you don't have beans you could collect some pebbles to paint or perhaps you could use marbles or jelly beans.
